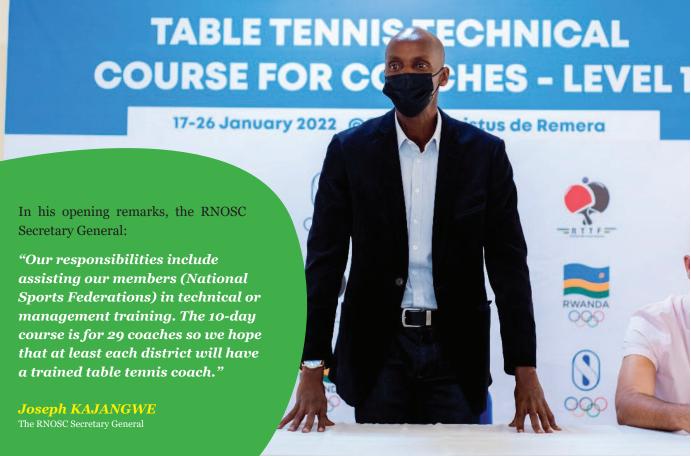
The 10-day workshop that held at Centre Christus – Remera, 28 out of 29 participants were awarded completion certificates and the course consisted of theoretical and Beside the knowledge, with support of the Mauritius Table Tennis Federation, Ping Sans Frontières and Go Sport Company, Mr. Cédric ROULEAU donated Table Tennis balls, nets, paddles and books to the Rwanda Table Tennis Federation

On January 18, 2022, the Secretary General of the Rwanda National Olympic and Sports Committee Mr. Joseph KAJANGWE together with the President of Rwanda Table Tennis Federation Mr. John Bosco Birungi officiated the opening ceremony of the training while the closing ceremony was attended by the President of Rwanda National Olympic and Sports Committee Mr. Theo UWAYO and the representative of Ministry of Sports Mr. Gervais MUNYANZIZA.









The expert Cédric ROULEAU praised the inclusiveness when it came to the representation of participants: "There are active and former players in the national team.

The Rwanda Schools Sports Federation is also represented and for the sustainable development of the game, it is always good to promote it in schools. People with disabilities and women have also taken part of in the course."

Révérien NSABIMANA, a trainee from Ruhango District, said they are going to start implementing what they have been taught in their clubs, which are located in different parts of the country and the federation pledged to keep assisting them.

During his closing remarks, the representative of the Ministry of Sports Gervais MUNYANZIZA: "I congratulate the RNOSC and Table Tennis Federation for the initiative. The Ministry will continue to closely work with various stakeholders such as the Rwanda National Olympic and Sports Committee to further accelerate the development of sports sector." The Rwanda Commonwealth Games Association (Rwanda CGA) in partnership with the National Paralympic Committee of Rwanda (NPC Rwanda) celebrated the Commonwealth Day 2022 on the 16th of March by organizing a Wheelchair Basketball 3X3 competition and skills challenge contest which took place at the NPC Gymnasium.

Four teams competed and the results are as follows; INGANIZI team (1st place), INDASHYIKIRWA team (2nd place), INDANGAMIRWA team (3rd place) and INGERI team (4th place) while for the skills challenge contest, six players competed and the top 3 were awarded including MUTABARE Joseph won the gold medal with trophy, MUHIRWA Hashim took home silver medal and HABAMENSHI Jean Claude got bronze.

During the 2022's celebration, the CGA Rwanda focused on promoting inclusion in sport and the event was graced by the Rwanda CGA President Mr. Theo Uwayo, the Governance Team Leader for British High Commission in Rwanda Mr. Adam Drury and NPC Rwanda Representative Mr. Jean Marie Nsengiyumva.

Their speeches revolved around the importance of celebrating Commonwealth Day and of sport itself.



The British High Commission Representative, Mr. Adam Drury: "I am so happy to celebrate the Commonwealth Day 2022 with Rwandan community as we reflect on the Commonwealth values. The theme of this year, "Delivering a Common Future", is celebrated today around parasport with Wheelchair Basketball. Indeed, sport is an important element that brings everyone together. The Birmingham 2022 will be really exciting - Inclusion and equality will be at the heart of the games and Wheelchair Basketball will be integrated for its first time into the sports events. I am really looking forward to cheering of course the UK Team but also the Rwanda Team in July."

"In honour of the Commonwealth Day 2022 celebration, the Rwanda Commonwealth Games Association decided to celebrate this special day by promoting inclusion in sport which is one of pillars of the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games. In partnership with the Ministry of Sports and National Sports Federations, we are working closely to make sure that we are fully supporting our athletes ahead of this international multi-sport event."

With support of the Commonwealth Games Federation (CGF) through the 2022 GAPS Africa Programme, Rwandan Para athlete Emmanuel Niyibizi attended local and international training camps for a period of six months and won two bronze medals in

Athletics - Men's T46 100m and 400m at the Dubai 2022 World Para Athletics Grand Prix - 13th Fazza International Para Athletics Championships that took place from 17th to 25th March 2022.





On 19th of March 2022, the Rwanda Martial Arts Sports Federations represented by the Rwanda National Olympic and Sports Committee (RNOSC) in partnership with Kigali Arena organized the first-ever festival named "Martial Art Sports Festival 1st Edition" with purpose of promoting unity, togetherness and development among all Martial Art Sports in Rwanda.

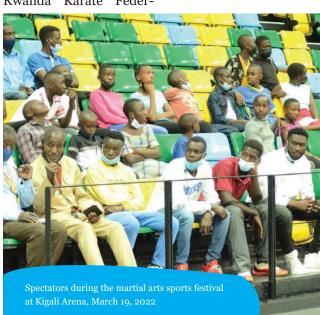

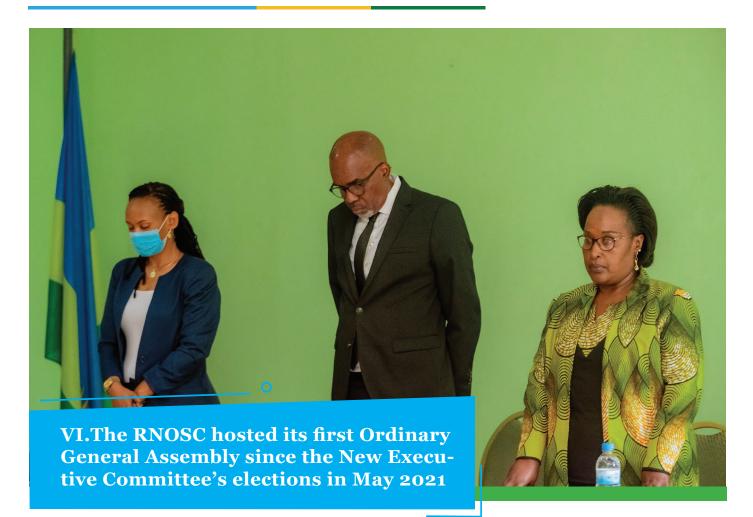
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The Rwanda National Olympic and Sports Committee (RNOSC) held its first Ordinary General Assembly on the 26th of March 2022 since the elections of the new Executive Committee and was chaired by the RNOSC President Mr. Theo UWAYO at Gorilla Hotel in Rubavu district.

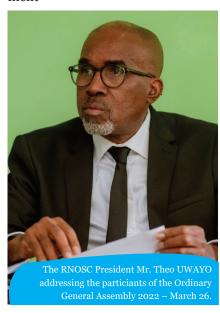
In his opening remarks, the RNOSC President thanked the members for attending the general asembly and gave some updates about the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games and upcoming events including Birmingham 2022 and Paris 2024.

"I commend all National Sports Federations for their significant contribution to the implementation of the covid-19 guidelines, and for Rwanda as a country that has been able to dramatically slow the spread of this pandemic. COVID-19 is a hindrance to the development of sport, that is why we must stay vigilant. In the first three months of this year 2022, as the RNOSC, we managed to organize a training session for Table Tennis Coaches where all districts were represented and we also celebrated the Commonwealth Day 2022 in this March," said the RNOSC President Mr. Theo UWAYO.

Over the last year, Rwanda was represented at Tokyo 2020 Olympics by 5 athletes in 3 sports include Athletics, Swimming and Cycling but unfortunately Rwanda did not win any medal - And also, in November 2021, Rwanda received the Queen's Baton and it toured different selected places in Kigali city ahead of the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games:

"We need to rethink the way we support our athletes/ sports if ending up on the international medal tables is truly our goal. Otherwise, the Queen's Baton Relay in Rwanda was a success thanks to our partners and government's support," the RNOSC President.

He concluded his speech by thanking the Ministry of Sports for its continued support towards the development of Rwanda Sport Movement



On the meeting's agenda, different items were presented and approved including the minutes of the RNOSC Ordinary General Assembly 2021, reports such as Activities and Financial Reports, Internal and External Audit Reports and the report on the Genocide Memorial Tournament 2021 (GMT 2021).

Following the Ordinary General Assembly 2022's approval, the Rwanda Netball Federation is the latest member of the Rwanda National Olympic and Sports Committee while the newly elected Executive Committees' members from Volleyball, Athletics, Handball, Taekwondo, Triathlon Federations and the Rwanda Workers' Sports Asso-

ciation (ARPST) were also officially welcomed aboard. Also, the General Assembly approved the nominations of the new Presidents of the RNOSC Commissions as follows, except for the Athletes' Commission and National Olympic Academy that will be confirmed later:

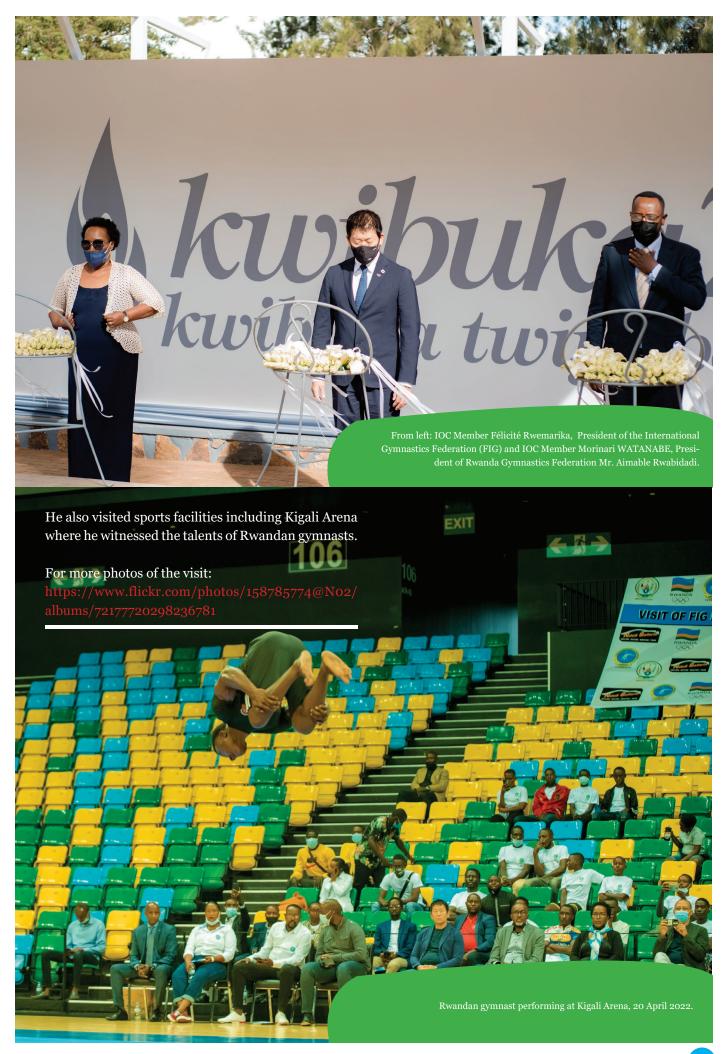

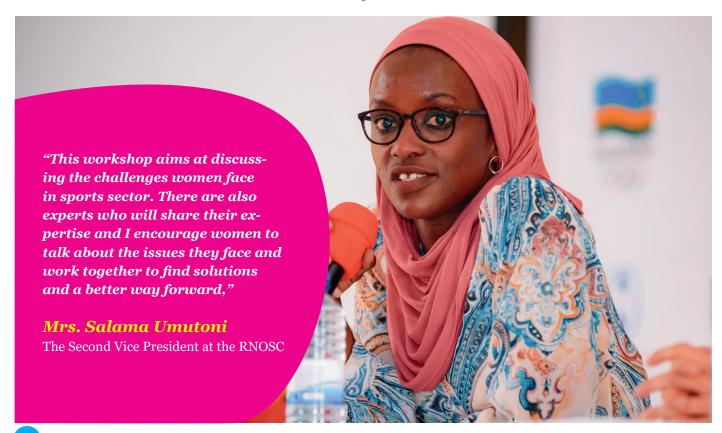

In her closing remarks, the IOC Member Mrs. Félicité RWEMARI-KA urged her fellow women to remain focused and take a leaf from a few who have excelled if they are to succeed in various sports disciplines.

"Firstly, we encourage women to believe in themselves, secondly, to improve their personal development skills and their contribution to the development of sport. You do not have to think that opportunities will come to you just because you are a woman but because you deserve it," Rwemarika said.

"We were able to hear from them, their challenges and what they want to be done. We are going to present them to competent authorities to find solutions for them toward creating a better environment for women in sports," she added.

XV.RNOSC attended the **ANOCA NOC Games Prepara**tion Forum 2022

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> m rom~o8\text{-}o9}$ July 2022, the National Olympic Committee of Uganda hosted African English speaking NOCs in a 2-day forum aiming at preparing the Paris 2024 Olympic Games.

> The Rwanda National Olympic and Sports Committee (RNOSC) was represented by its Second Vice President Mrs. Salama Umutoni and the Executive Director Mr. Jean de Dieu Mukundiyukuri.

> The workshop was officially opened by the Chair of the Uganda Sport Council Mr. Ambrose Tashobya. In attendance were also the President of NOC Uganda Dr. Donald Rukare and the IOC Team and Olympic Solidarity represented by Yassine Yousfi and the Secretary General of ANOCA Eng. Ahmed Abou Hashim Elgasim.



Rwanda as one of 56 Commonwealth countries participated at the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games that held in Birmingham, England between 28 July and 8 August 2022. Rwandan athletes competed in Beach Volleyball, Athletics, Swimming and Cycling. The Men's Beach Volleyball Team finished 4th for the first time ever while athlete Yves Nimubona Yves finished 5th in Athletics - Men's 5,000M final.

The Birmingham 2022 games were the biggest ever quadrennial sports event held in the history among athletes from the Commonwealth of Nations; 19 different sports, 877 medals awarded,

96 Commonwealth Games records and 4 world records were broken, with 72 participating nations allowing over 1.5 million ticket sales. The inclusion was also at the heart of these Games,

as Birmingham 2022 featured the largest integrated Para Sport competitions in history.



XVI.1. Training camp ahead of the Commonwealth Games 2022

In May, the National Team started the official the training camps in preparation for the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games while participating in different local and international competitions.

The final training camp took place from 01-23 July 2022 with Athletics, Swimming and Cycling at Golden Tulip Hotel - Nyamata in Bugesera District and Beach Volleyball Team in Rubayu District.



Before departing to England on the 23rd July for the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games, the National Team was flagged off by the Acting Director of Sports in the Ministry of Sports Mr. Gervais Munyanziza accompanied by the CGA Rwanda First Vice President Mrs. Alice Umulinga. 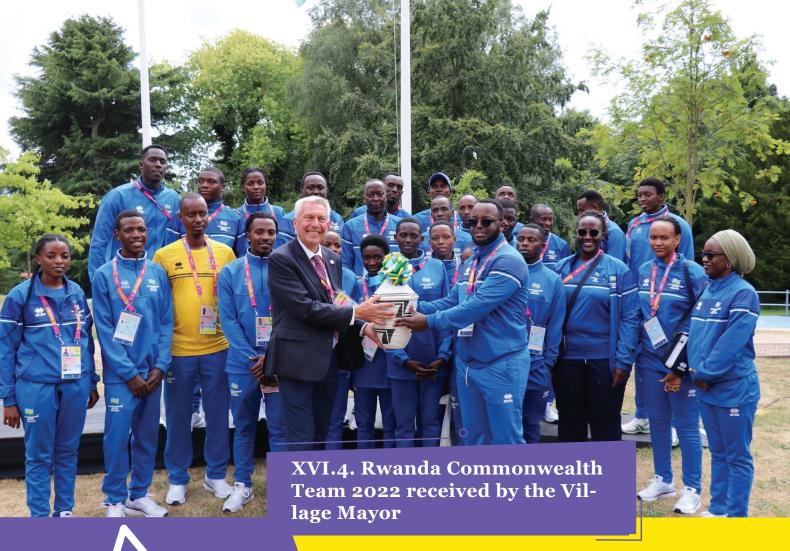

XVI.8. Athletes' Performance at the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games

XVI.8.1. Beach Volleyball



 $T_{\text{he Beach Volleyball competitions}}$ took place at Smithfield, in Birmingham city centre from 30 July to 07 August and 12 countries including Rwanda competed in Men's Beach Volleyball.

The duo of Olivier Ntagengwa and Vénuste Gatsinzi finished 4th after loosing to the Host nation Team England. Australia Gold, Canada Silver,

England

Birmingham 2022 marked the Beach Volleyball's second appearance at the Commonwealth Games whilst It was the first time for the Rwandan Men's Beach Volleyball Team to participate in.







Both the road race and time trial at the 2022 Commonwealth Games took place within the West Midlands and the surrounding area of Birmingham. Team Rwanda was composed by 5 male and 3 female cyclists.

Men & Women's Time trial

The men's and women's time trial began in West Park, Wolverhampton on 04 August 2022, heading out in a loop before finishing back within the city, the women tackled a 29 kilometers route, whereas the men's course was slightly longer at 37 kilometers.

Team Rwanda was represented by Mugisha Moise and Uhiriwe Byiza Renus in men's category and by Diane Ingabire and Tuyishime Jacqueline in women's category.

Mugisha and Uhiriwe finished 17th and 27th respectively in 57 cyclists while Ingabire finished 25th and 26th place for Tuyishime in 36 female cyclists.

Men & Women's road race -Final

On the 7th August, the men's road race saw the riders tackled 160 kilometers over ten laps of the course in Warwick while the women covered seven laps of the course totaling 112

kilometers. Rwanda competed with 8 athletes (5 men and 3 women).

A total of 124 cyclists competed in men's category whereas 51 among them did not finish. Uhiriwe Byiza Renus finished on the 23rd place, Eric Umuhoza on the 33rd place, Mugisha Moise on the 36th place, Eric Manizabayo on the 54th and Samuel Mugisha did not finish the race.

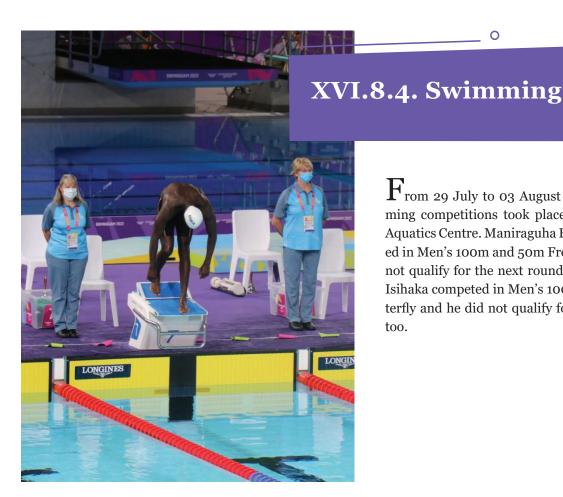
In women's category of 56 cyclists, 3 Rwandan athletes Mukashema Josiane, Ingabire Diane and Tuyishime Jacqueline did not finish the race.

From 29 July to 03 August 2022, the Swimming competitions took place at the Sandwell Aquatics Centre. Maniraguha Eloi, OLY competed in Men's 100m and 50m Freestyle and he did not qualify for the next round while Irankunda Isihaka competed in Men's 100m and 50m Butterfly and he did not qualify for the next round too.

XVII.RNOSC attended the XXVI MBLY ANOC General Assembly Seoul 2022

On 18-21 October 2022, the Association of National Olympic Committees (ANOC) successfully hosted its XXVI ANOC General Assembly that held in Seoul, the Republic of Korea.

This largest global meeting brought together the world's National Olympic Committees (NOCs) joined by representatives from the International Olympic Committee (IOC), International Sports Federations and Organising Committees of the Olympic Games.

The Rwanda National Olympic and Sports Committee (RNOSC) was

represented by the IOC Member Felicite Rwemarika, RNOSC First Vice-President Mrs. Alice Umulinga and the RNOSC Advisor Mr. Jean Butovi.

Speaking during the ANOC General Assembly, Acting ANOC President Robin Mitchell said:

"We in ANOC should not for take for granted just how significant and unique it is to host an event attended by representatives from nearly 200 countries. As a global NOC family we are made up of so many different cultures and backgrounds." In his opening remarks, the IOC President Thomas Bach said:

"In this true Olympic spirit of solidarity and peace, I invite you all to join hands, to stand united with confidence in each other, as we have been doing so well in the past years. Let us not divide our precious Olympic Movement. Let us together walk this path of unity and peace. Let us together live up to our Olympic mission.

The ANOC Awards also took place on the sidelines of the General Assembly, to celebrate the athletes and NOCs of the Olympic Winter Games Beijing 2022.

- The ANOC General Assembly approved the Audited Financial Statements for 2021.

- ANOC and NOC Indonesia signed the Host City Contract for the ANOC World Beach Games 2023. The ANOC Events Commission and NOC Indonesia updated the ANOC General Assembly on the significant preparations underway for the Games
- The ANOC General Assembly approved the amendment to the Constitution regarding the composition of the ANOC Athletes' Commission.
- The Organising Committee of the Olympic Winter Games Beijing 2022 delivered its final report to the ANOC General Assembly, reporting on the success of the Games.
- The Organising Committees of Paris 2024 and Milano-Cortina 2026 and the Gangwon 2024 Winter Youth Olympic Games gave positives update on their preparations.
- The ANOC General Assembly approved the reports of its different Commissions and congratulated the Chairs of the Commissions for excellent work.
- heard an update from the IOC Administration and its Director General, Mr. Christophe de Kepper and from the Director of Olympic Solidarity and NOC Services, Mr James MacLeod, about the support available to NOCs.

XX.3. Team Support Grant program

This program is designed for a team sport with the high chances to qualify to the Olympic Games and both Women and Men's Beach Volleyball Teams are beneficiaries of this program with the aim of qualifying for Paris 2024.

XX.4. Youth Athlete Development Programme 2021-2024

With support of the Olympic Solidarity, the Rwanda National Olympic and Sports Committee in partnership with four selected National Sports Federations namely Swimming, Tennis, Table Tennis and Cycling, identified 130 young athletes out of 372 who participated in the first phase of the "Youth Athlete Development Programme 2021-2024". The selected youngsters aged be-

tween 10 and 14 years old will benefit from a series of national training camps over the next four years and will be exposed to the various International Federations training opportunities ahead of the Dakar 2026 Olympic Youth Games and other future international competitions such as the African Youth Games 2026, which is set to take place in Maseru, Lesotho.

XX.4.1. Cycling



As one of the selected National Sports Federations to be part of the "Youth Athlete Development Programme 2021-2024", the Rwanda Cycling Federation organized a "Youth Athlete Identification" on 04 December 2022 at Gasore Serge Foundation

in Bugesera district and on 11 December 2022 in Musanze and Huye districts. 30 from 73 participants were selected to continue the programme.

XX.4.2. Swimming



The Rwanda Swimming Federation held its Youth Athlete Identification on 22 October 2022 and on 10 November 2022 in Karongi district and Kigali city respectively. In 134 young swimmers, 30 athletes were selected for the next preparations.

XX.4.3 Table Tennis



40 out 80 players were selected for the Rwanda table Tennis to take part at the Youth Athlete Development Programme 2021-2024. The selections took place on 29-30 October 2022 in Bugesera

district, on 05-06 November 2022 in Rubavu district and on 12-13 November 2022 in Kigali city.

XX.4.4. Tennis

On 12-13 November 2022, the Rwanda Table Tennis Federation brought together 85 young athletes at the IPRC-Kigali Tennis Court and 30 of them were selected to start the road to Dakar 2026.

The Rwanda National Olympic and Sports Committee, in collaboration with the selected National Sports Federations will continue to support



the selected young talented athletes by providing them with training camps, helping them to participate in qualifying tournaments and international competitions while targeting the Dakar 2026 Olympic Youth Games.



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
